Make sure you know your legal rights and responsibilities. Search online for 'tenants' union' or 'fair trading' in your state or territory. Before you do any paid work, check your visa allows you to work. **Employment** There is a national minimum wage, and you may get paid more if you work weekends or late nights. There are also entitlements you should be aware of such as casual loading and superannuation. You can arrange to have your superannuation paid to you when you leave Australia.
